


## 2020 PCA Virtual Conference Awards Ceremony






### Outstanding Supervisor Award: **Abra Kuniak**

Abra also performs CISM in the hospital system in which she works. Abra's experience aids in decreasing crisis events and the impact of traumatic events.



#### Outstanding Professional Teaching Award: **Dr. Deborah L. Duenyas**



Deborah has recently been elected as the Pennsylvania Counseling Association (PCA) President-Elect for the 2020-2021 academic year. She has taught graduate courses in professional orientation and ethics, family systems, neuroscience for counselors, tests and assessment in counseling, research methods, fundamentals of counseling, counseling theories, and Master's-level practicum and internship courses. Deborah has forged a research and scholarly agenda around the topics of neuroscience-informed counseling, using creativity in counseling, professional adjustment for counselors, counseling as a global profession, and social justice/advocacy for marginalized populations.

### Outstanding Research Publication: **Dr. Jered Kolbert**

Jered B. Kolbert is the Co-Director of Duquesne University's Counselor Education Program. Dr. Kolbert is a certified school counselor and Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) in Pennsylvania. #### Lifetime Achievement Award: Dr. Paul Niemiec

- Paul A. Niemiec is the Director of Counseling Services for Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Greensburg, where he has
  practiced for 19 years. He is a counselor with almost 35 years' experience working with couples and families. Paul works with
  individuals, couples, and families, and supervises the clinical work of the counseling staff. Paul maintains several other diocesan
  appointments, including Victim Assistance Coordinator, consultant to the Office of Clergy Formation, the diocesan deans, and
  the Vicar General. Paul is a member of the Diocesan Review Board, the Admissions and Scrutinies Committee for the Office of
  the Permanent Diaconate, and the Seminarian Review Board. He is an evaluator for the Matrimonial Tribunal.
- Paul earned his doctorate in counselor education and supervision from Duquesne University in 2002. He received his Bachelor's degree in psychology from St. Vincent College and his Master of Science degree in Health Related Professions from the University of Pittsburgh. Paul is a Licensed Professional Counselor in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Prior to his appointment at Catholic Charities, Paul was associate professor in the social work and child and family studies programs at the Community College of Allegheny County. He was an adjunct instructor in Counselor Education and Supervision at Duquesne University and in Marriage and Family Therapy at Seton Hill University. He was a supervisor and program director of homebased counseling services for different child welfare services in Westmoreland, Allegheny, Washington, and Fayette Counties. Paul was a counselor for many years with the Lutheran Service Society.
- Paul currently holds an adjunct teaching position in the Department of Psychology at St. Vincent College, Latrobe, PA, where he teaches courses including Family Systems, Introduction to Counseling, History and Systems of Psychology, and Positive Psychology for 30 years.

#### David W. Hall Advocacy Award: Lisa Corbin

Lisa Corbin, MA, MS, LPC, NCC has worked on college campuses for more than 20 years. She has held positions in both student life and academic affairs. Prof. Corbin currently serves as an assistant professor in the School of Professional and Applied Psychology where she teaches and advises mental health counseling students.

In addition to her work at PCOM, Prof. Corbin serves as the trauma counselor at a Philadelphia inpatient recovery facility for males. She runs groups for male survivors of childhood sexual abuse, groups on mindful meditation as well as a grief and loss support group.

Prof. Corbin is completing her PhD in Counselor Education and Supervision and has just completed her internship at a local rape crisis center where she provided trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy to individuals and families.

Prof. Corbin is active in the Pennsylvania Counseling Association (PCA) where she served as conference chair and is also active with the Greater Philadelphia Area Counseling Association (GPACA) where she is currently serving as secretary. She is writing her dissertation on variables that predict career choice within the field of counseling. Her hope is to use this data to increase diversity among the counseling profession.
